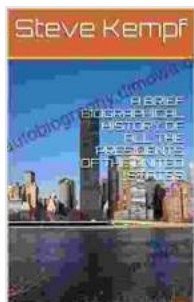

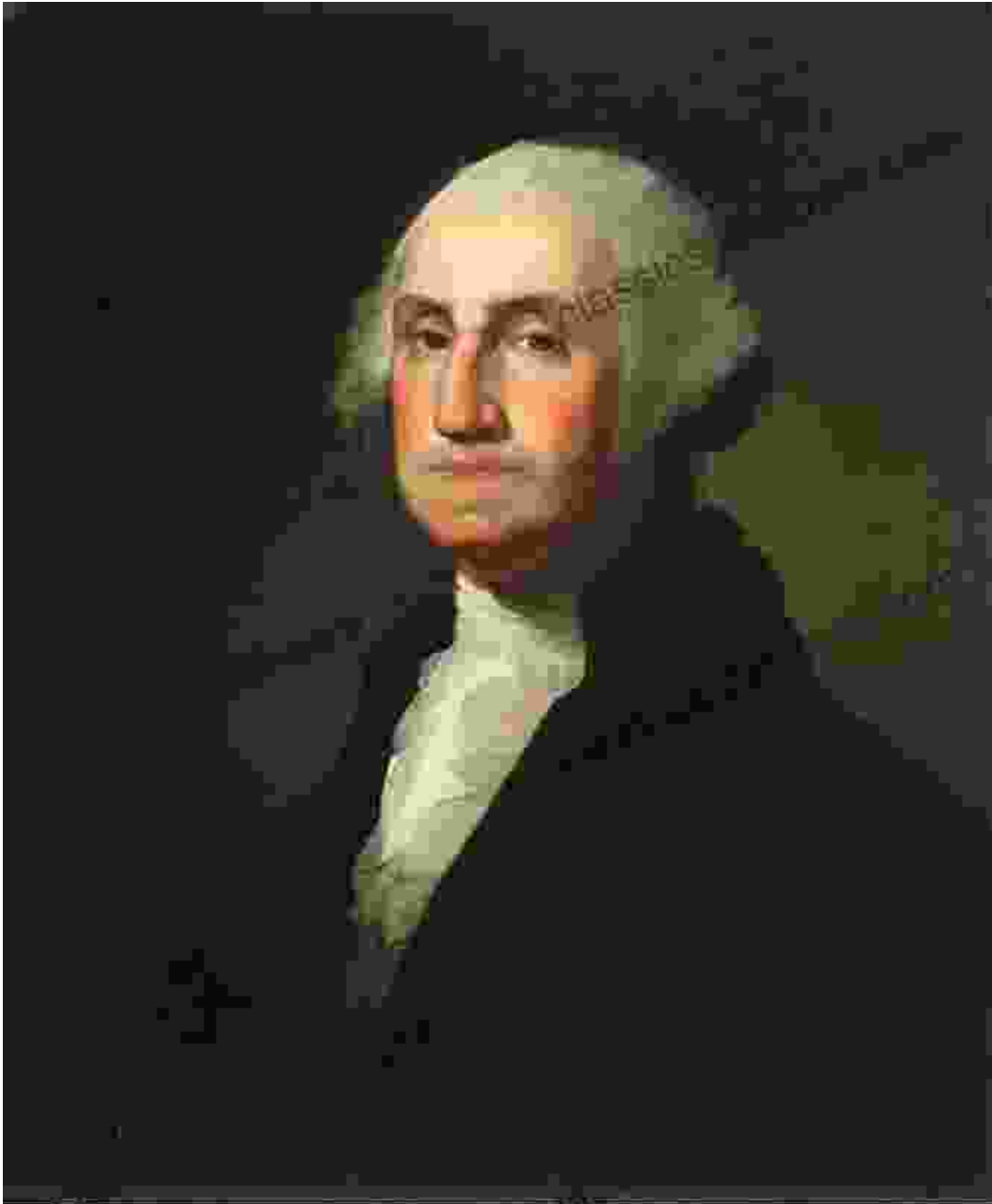

George Washington (1789-1797)

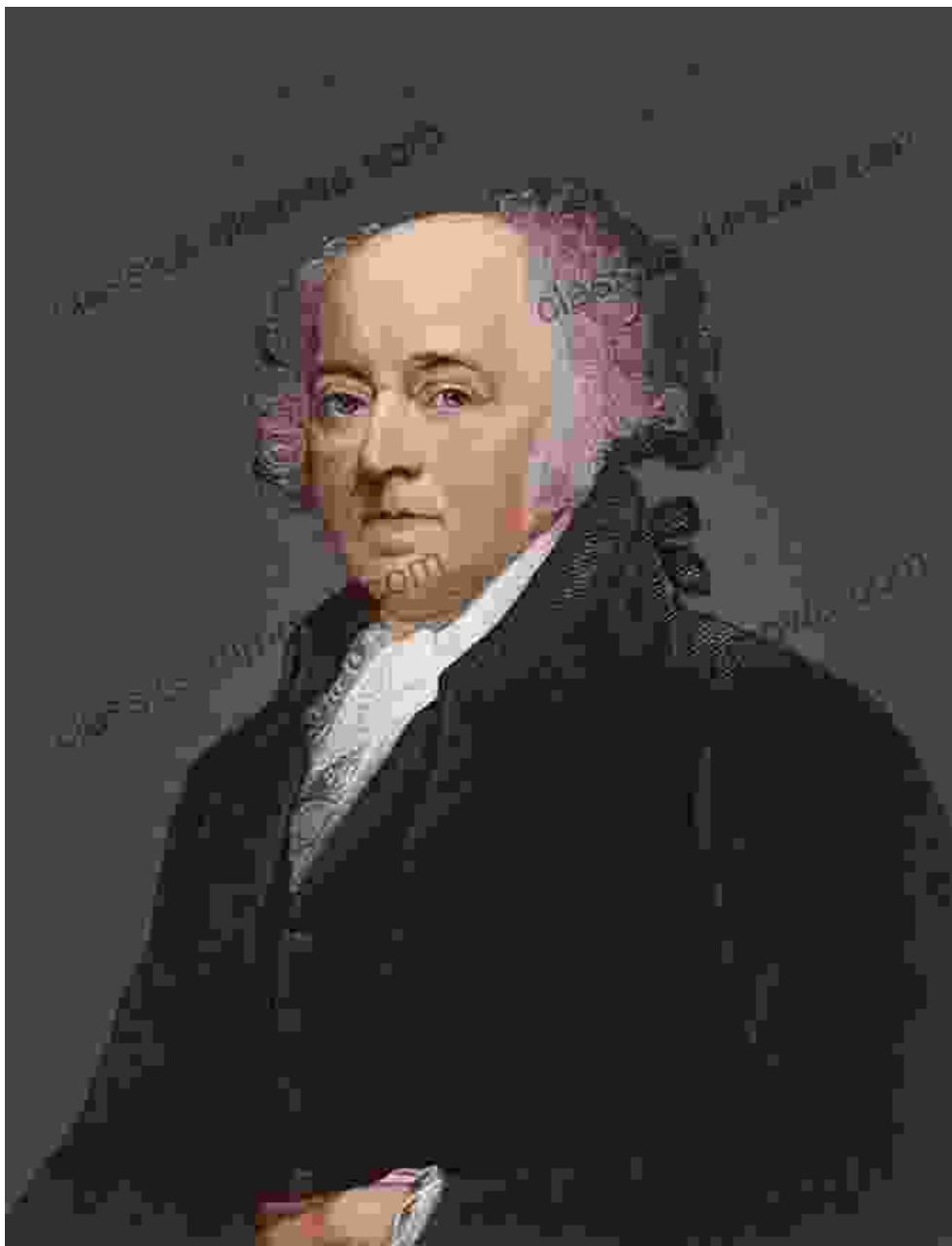

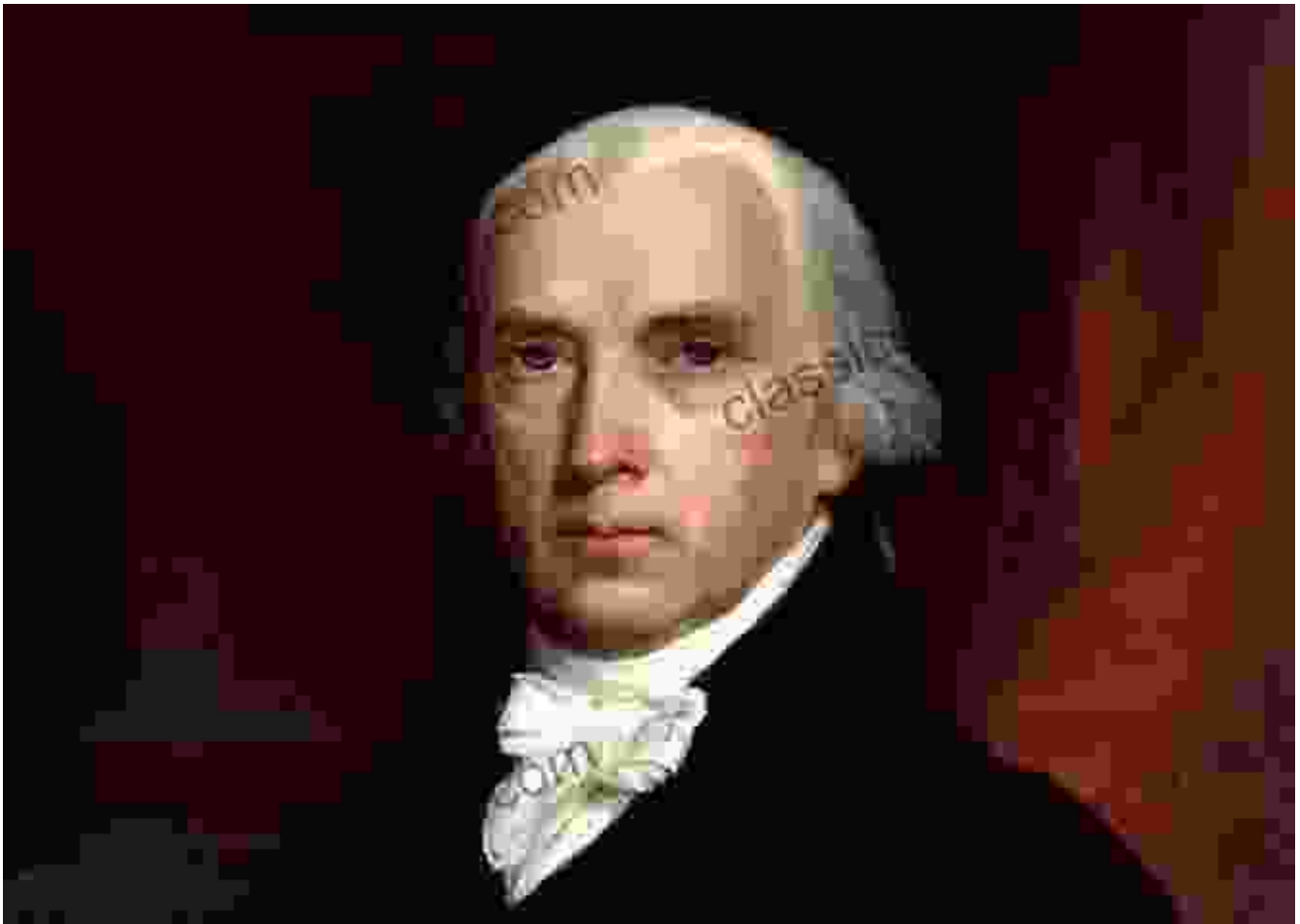
Thomas Jefferson (1801-1809)

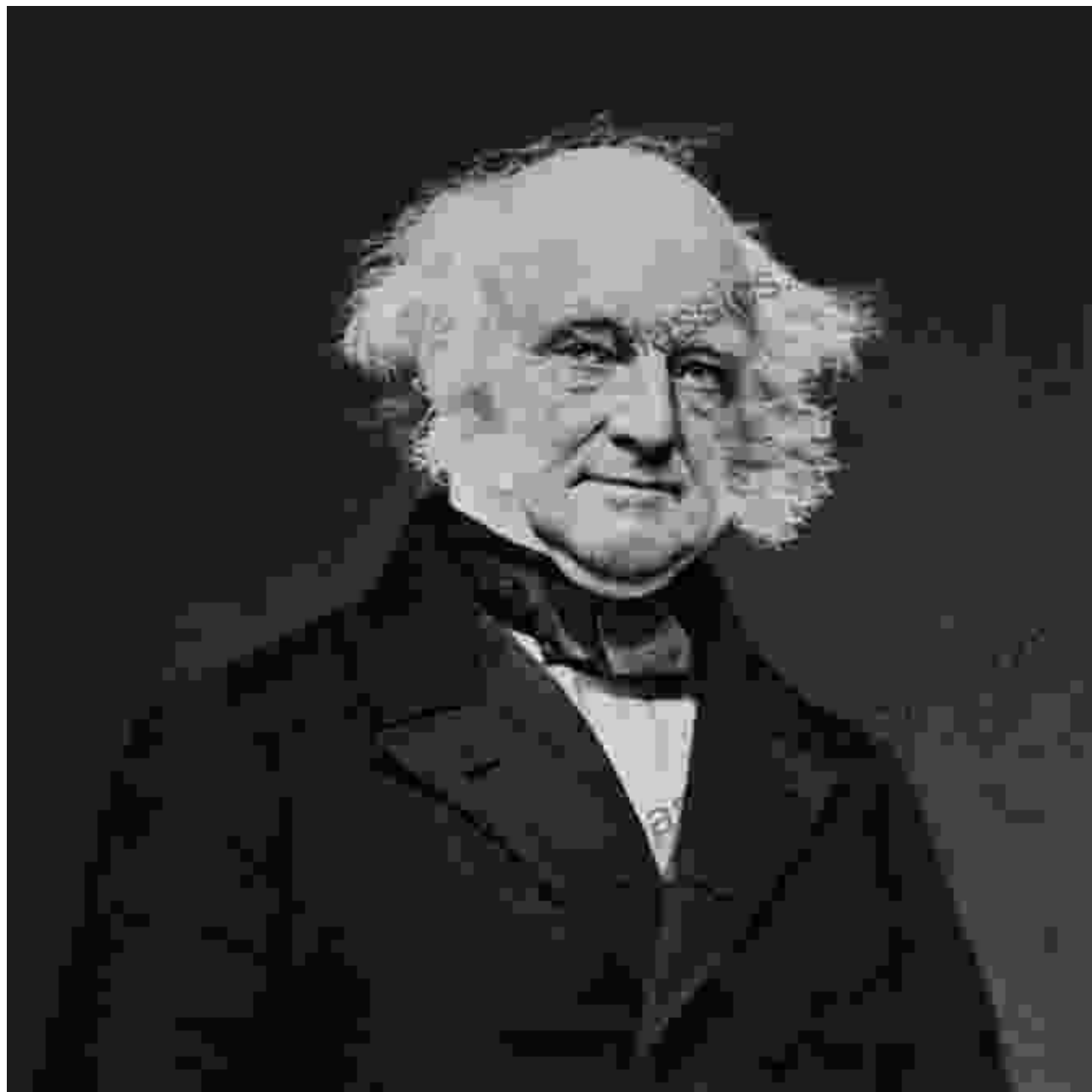
Andrew Jackson (1829-1837)

Martin Van Buren (1837-1841)

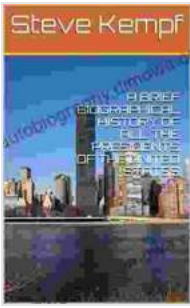

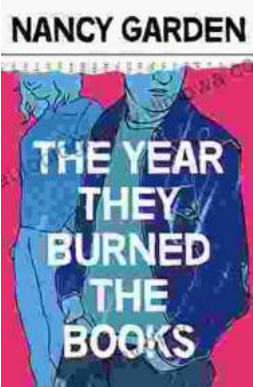
